1. Pat Kelly, Chair, called the meeting to order at 12:07 p.m. The Board meeting was held with Board members attending either virtually or in-person.

a. Study Session:

- 1. Intensive Residential Treatment (IRT): Carrie Gavitt from ComCor, Inc. (CCI) discussed their IRT Program. IRT is a 90-day program, 40 hours per week (minimum), 6 days per week of direct therapeutic contact with 514 total hours required, no employment during the 90 days and passes are restricted. All individuals must assess at Level 4c (Level 5-Probation) to be eligible for the IRT Program. Carrie Gavitt stated that CCI provides 25.5 hours of group therapy per week (20 minimum), 14.5 hours of psychoeducational groups per week (i.e., Criminogenic Need Focused Groups antisocial thinking, antisocial associations, impulse control, substance dependence), yoga (currently on-hold due to COVID,) AA, and anger management, individual therapy, structured and targeted case management, psychiatric services, and incentive based supervised outings (monthly).
- 2. Residential Dual Diagnosis Treatment (RDDT): Carrie Gavitt from ComCor, Inc. (CCI) discussed their RDDT Program. The RDDT program is a transitional residential treatment program focused on addressing substance use disorders, mental health, and criminal conduct of the members. The RDDT Program is currently available to male clients. The program is not a time limited program, with successful completion based on stabilization and completion of goals. All individuals must assess at Level 4a, 4b, or 4c to be eligible. The program requirements are 8 hours per week (minimum), 5 of the hours must be direct therapeutic contact and 5 days per week of contact.
- 3. Community Responsibility Program (CRP): Kristi Foss from ComCor, Inc. (CCI) discussed their CRP. She stated the benefits of CRP at ComCor, Inc. are weekly community supervision team staffing, GPS monitoring, substance abuse testing, movement in the community, psychiatric services to include medications, correctional accountability, peer chaperone/accountability, living with peers, non-residential peers, ability to focus on treatment, couples counseling, and supervised visitation/reunification.

Kristi Foss stated the risk associated with a CCB denial is that a defendant is sent before the court without a community corrections option and may be re-granted probation, return to community without a higher level of intervention, short sentence in prison without sex offense specific treatment, temporary containment solution and eventual release back to the community under supervision of parole.

- **2. Attendance:** The Board Chair called roll. Future excused absences were requested by Judge Chad Miller for December 21, 2021.
- **3.** Case Review VRA Statements: Registered victims in proposed client cases (Tommy Williams, Judy Ruth, Carl Cumby, and Grant Motsinger) addressed the board.
- **4.** Case Review: Discussion and Balloting: Chair Pat Kelly called for case discussion with no cases called.
- 5. Approval of the Minutes: Dr. Judith McCollum moved to approve the meeting minutes for October 13, 2021, and the electronic meeting minutes for October 6, 20, and 27, 2021. Martha McKinney seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by roll call vote.

6. Program Reports:

- a. **ComCor, Inc. (CCI):** Mark Wester reported for CCI. He reported that the capacity was 225; that they collected just under \$13,000 in restitution; that they had 190 referrals; and they had 20 successful and 22 unsuccessful terminations; that they had 12 escapes, 10 were existing clients and two arrived the same day and escaped before paperwork was processed and that they had a 77% employment rate.
- b. Community Alternatives of El Paso County (CAE): Gwen Barlow reported for CAE. Ms. Barlow stated they had a census of 172 clients; that they collected \$9,233.96 in restitution; that they had 97 referrals; and that they had 13 escapes but had three clients arrived the same day and escaped during intake process (two were diversion clients and one transition client). During the month of October, CAE started the Peer Monitoring Program and had a meeting and 18 clients participated in the program. Ms. Barlow introduced CAE's Risk Reduction Strategies in response to the Performance and Accountability in Correctional Excellence (PACE) and Core Security Audits. The PACE Audit identified a focus on training all staff in the areas of MI/SOA-R/Staff Impact and Progression Matrix. CAE will participate in leadership, change agent, effective communications, policy development, budget protocols, and case planning and assessment fidelity. Ms. Gwen stated that from the Core Security Audit they identified two focus areas, contraband, and unauthorized absence.

7. Monthly Reports:

- a. <u>SFY22 Financial Report</u>: Angel Medina reported the current expected expenditure for SFY22 is 33.33%. CAE is 8.35% underspent and ComCor, Inc. is .19% overspent.
- b. <u>Unauthorized Absence Report</u>: Angel Medina reported that for the end of October 2021, the unauthorized absence rate for Diversion clients was 39.5% and 25.4% for Transition clients (23 total clients for the month October). He reported the successful completion rate for Diversion clients was 28.5% and 46.9% for Transitional clients.
- c. <u>Staff Report:</u> Angel Medina mentioned that the Colorado Association of Community Corrections Boards (CACCB) met on October 22, 2021 and provided updates on the following matters:

- 1. Senate Bill 138 created a Behavioral Health Task for Traumatic Brain Injury training needs in the Criminal Justice System.
- 2. The Division of Criminal Justice, Office of Community Correction's Performance Based-Contracting and Payment Model information is due to the Legislature in January 2022.
- 3. The Community Corrections census across the state is still down even though several areas have a waitlist. Staff shortages have contributed to the waitlist problem.
- 4. The CACCB met and discussed the contract with CSU to research Community Correction gaps in services and programming. This report is scheduled to be available in early Summer 2022.
- 5. The CACCB recognized Mr. Mark Wester of ComCor, Inc. Inc. as the new chair for the vendor's Coalition.
- 6. The CACCB discussed the Governor's direction to keep Criminal Justice Bills to a minimum. A proposed House Bill on *Certainty in Sentencing* could possibly eliminate discretionary parole.
- 7. The Parole Board discussed the need for more Intensive Residential Treatment beds and efforts to mitigate Parole Revocation matters.
- 8. The CO Department of Corrections presented an update on the Client Termination process.
- 9. The next CACCB Meeting is scheduled for February 2022.

Mr. Medina informed the board that the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) of the Pikes Peak Region reviews local criminal justice matters that promote a more equitable system and that Kirsten Swenson has volunteered to serve on the CJCC on behalf of the Community Corrections Board.

Mr. Medina stated that based on CCB feedback on the 2021 Analysis and Recommendations Survey, that the monthly Vendor Report was restructured to identify only key information that is utilized by the CCB members and vendor staff. There was a common theme of why participants reviewed the monthly report: to understand trends with escapes/escape rates, staffing levels, complaints, increased absences, completion rates for all programs, positive UA numbers. The Vendors will provide narrative noting their progress for PACE and CORE Security in each area of focus.

Mr. Medina reported that beginning December 1, 2021, Diversion and Transition Out of District referrals will be suspended. EPC currently has 90 on the waitlist for Transition and the Diversion referrals remain steady. Any out of district referrals received after November 30, 2021, will be redirected to CDOC or the sending Judicial District. As appropriate this moratorium will be reviewed monthly.

8. Old Business:

a. Community Corrections Data and Outcomes Update: Angel Medina stated staff have been participating in a series of Performance -Based Contracting workshops hosted by the Division of Criminal Justice. On August 19, 2021 the El Paso County staff met with each provider to discuss SFY22 Performance Standards and the Vendor Report. He stated the PACE, Core Security Audits, and outcomes must be utilized to ensure greater accountability and improved clients services. Vendors have been asked to create risk reduction strategies to enhance safety, security, and services (as heard today from Community of Alternative of El Paso (CAE). ComCor, Inc. completed their Risk Reduction Strategy and presented to the CCB on December 13, 2021. A revised vendor report has been created which aligns with the direction and expectations of Performance-Based Contracting. PACE and CORE Security areas of focus will be presented to the CCB at each monthly meeting capturing their efforts to

improve client success rates. The Office of Community Corrections (OCC) is in the process of determining the details of performance-based contracting with stakeholder input.

- b. <u>Electronic Balloting System</u>: Orientation and training to the Electronic Balloting System continues to be provided to Board members. Live electronic balloting for the CCB is tentatively scheduled for December 21, 2021.
- c. <u>Unauthorized Absence and Financial Reports</u>: Angel Medina presented the financial and unauthorized absence reports from previous months.

9. New Business:

a. <u>Provider Notification Process – Revised:</u> Angel Medina discussed the provider notification process; that the matrix affords vendors a quick and easy reference guide to issues and activities requiring notification to the CCB and El Paso County (EPC) staff. He stated that staff has been working with vendors to enhance the notification process and requirements. The revised and enhanced aspects of the Provider Notification Process appeared in red font that was attached in the agenda packet.

Jim Reid moved to approve the revised Provider Notification Process Matrix. Gil Suazo seconded. The motion passed unanimously by roll call vote.

b. <u>ComCor, Inc. Staff Hiring Waiver Request</u>: Angel Medina stated that ComCor, Inc. (CCI) is requesting approval to an application for the position of Client Support Specialist. Marlene Garcia has previous felony convictions. CCI is asking the board to provide Ms. Garcia the opportunity to work at City Hope, a non-correctional facility, and would like the boards' approval to hire her in the future at ComCor, Inc.

The board is requesting further information regarding the nature of the offense or offenses (types of conviction or convictions) and postponed the vote to the next board meeting on December 21, 2021.

c. <u>Maximum Referrals per Ballot</u>: Angel Medina stated that the typical maximum number of packets to review on each ballot is twenty-two (22). The number of packets may increase due to increased referrals, which in general are transition referrals. During times of increased referrals, it can take longer than usual to get packets on the ballot for review. The time periods have increased from five (5) weeks to eight (8) weeks from the time El Paso County receives them. The current waitlist for Transitional Referrals is 90. To accommodate these times of increased referrals, the packets have typically been increased up to twenty-five (25) per ballot.

Kristen Swenson moved to approve the increase up to twenty-five (25) per ballot. Gil Suazo seconded. The motion passed unanimously by roll call vote.

Lori Griffith left the meeting at 1:39.

- d. **Board/Staff Comments:** Chair Pat Kelly asked for any comments. No comments were made.






COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS PROGRAM DATA

For all other referrals scheduled for the In-Person Board Meeting, the Board will complete and submit their votes to EPC staff by 10:00 a.m.
- 2. Currently, the Colorado Department of Corrections (CDOC) Community Referral Unit (CRU) sends an Intensive Supervision Program Inmate (ISP-I) referral to the EPC Community Corrections Board for decision to place or not to place the offender in El Paso County **prior to** the Community Parole Officer completing the investigation report. The investigative report determines if the residence proposed is safe, stable, and supportive to the offender's needs. This referral appears on the ballot and the Board votes on their placement.

After consulting with CDOC Community Referral Unit, this process will be amended in the following manner. The EPC Community Corrections Board will only receive the referral **after** the investigative report of the proposed residence is found to be suitable. If the proposed residence is found to be unsuitable the referral will be closed out by the CRU. Additionally, we have requested the CRU to include a summary of completed programming, institutional work history, and the offender's current program and/or work assignment with all referrals.

To ensure our vendors deliver the highest levels of safety, security, and program services to offenders the below initiatives were jointly structured and implemented by EPC staff and the Vendors. The Community Corrections Board (CCB) staff will continue to monitor vendor performance and compliance with these expectations and will regularly provide the Community Corrections Board updates on their status and progress.

On August 19, 2021, the CCB staff met with each provider to discuss Performance Standards for SFY22 and the Vendor Report. Discussion items included:

- 1. Performance Standards and Opportunities for July 1, 2021 June 30, 2022
- 2. Develop a Risk Reduction Strategy to address areas of focus identified in their PACE profile and CORE Security audit. As scheduled, each Vendor will present to their strategy to the CCB.
 - ComCor, Inc. presented their Risk Reduction Strategy to CCB on 10/13/2021.
 - CAE presented their Risk Reduction Strategy to CCB on 11/16/2021.
- 3. The Vendor Report A shorter form of this report has been created with only key, prioritized information utilized by CCB members and vendor staff. The report is in line with the direction and expectations of Performance-Based Contracting. PACE and CORE Security areas of focus will be presented to the CCB at each monthly meeting capturing their efforts to improve client success rates.

Currently, the Office of Community Corrections (OCC) is in the process of determining the details of performance-based contracting with stakeholder input.

Note: As part of its FY 2022-23 budget request, the <u>Colorado Department of Public Safety</u> (Department) is requested to submit a proposal for the implementation of performance-based contracting. This proposal should include payment models, outcomes to evaluate the performance of community providers and local community corrections boards, baseline targets for the Program Assessment for Correctional Excellence (PACE) and core security audits, the frequency of PACE and core security audits, and a warning system for underperforming providers.

Subject: Community Corrections Budget Proposal Update: Fiscal Year 2022-23

Earlier this month Governor Jarod Polis released his budget proposal request for the upcoming fiscal year. The budget request includes an emphasis on addressing pressing issues while focusing on Colorado's future. He shared his vision for the budget with the following statement.

"Ending the pandemic remains my top priority as Governor, but I'm also committed to improving air quality and fighting crime while reducing fees and payroll taxes and protecting our Colorado way of life. We've seen the challenges that the pandemic has exposed in our workforce, healthcare, and child care systems, as well as in our small business sector, all of which have added additional pressures to Coloradans facing rising costs of living. My proposed balanced budget aims to build on the foundation that has been laid to help Colorado recover faster and stronger, and ensure that every Coloradan has the opportunity to get ahead, while living in a safe and thriving community."

Community Corrections faired well in the proposal. The overall budget was continued into the next fiscal year, thought there is an impact on a specific program.

- (1) Community Corrections Providers Support. The proposal includes a one percent increase in provider rates across the state. The increase would be applied to the community corrections per diem rates.
- (2) Completion of Cognitive Behavioral Treatment (CBT) Pilot. After six years of the pilot program designed around cognitive behavioral therapy, the general fund dollars utilized to operate the program are not requested moving forward. Unpredictable circumstances involving vendor changes, location change, and the COVID-19 pandemic have created unsurmountable obstacles to conduct an appropriate evaluation of the program. Completion of the funding reflects these barriers and not a reflection of the program itself. Huge appreciation to Denver for their diligent effort to

In addition to the above, the Governor's budget request also includes funding for the Department to cover the costs for hosting, maintaining, and ensuring the security of the new Community Corrections Information and Billing (CCIB) system. These funds will help to ensure that the new system not only stays healthy and viable for the future to come, but can continue to adapt to the evolving community corrections system.

Overall, the budget request demonstrates the continued support for the community corrections system and includes the funding that may be needed if we see a return to pre-pandemic census.
