1. Pat Kelly, Chair, called the meeting to order at 12:15 p.m. The Board meeting was held with Board members attending either virtually or in-person.

- a. <u>Study Session</u>: Colorado State Board of Parole Mr. Chad Dilworth, Vice-Chair of the Colorado State Board of Parole (CSBP), presented an overview of the Parole Board's procedures. He discussed standards and guidelines for assessment, evaluation, treatment, and behavioral monitoring of Colorado's parolees. The CSPB manages parolees to reduce recidivism. Mr. Dilworth stated that community corrections provide some stability between the transition from Prison to Parole. Mr. Dilworth stated that Parole is looking to improve the process for notification. Angel Medina stated that a letter from Parole when they make a recommendation would be helpful. Mr. Dilworth stated that Parole appreciates the specialized programming that is available through vendors to include Intensive Residential Treatment (IRT), Residential Dual Diagnosis Treatment (RDDT), and Sex Offender Treatment (CRP).
- 2. Attendance: The Board Chair called roll. Future excused absences were requested by Pat Kelly for March 15, 2022.
- 3. Case Review VRA Statements: Registered victims in proposed client cases (Joseph Nickerson, Robert Allen, and Simone Moore) addressed the board.
- 4. Case Review: Discussion and Balloting: Chair Pat Kelly called for a case discussion regarding Mr. Robert Allen. Lori Griffith clarified the plea agreement for Mr. Robert Allen. Mr. Allen's plea agreement was not completely stated, and Mr. Allen wanted an appeal and the PSI indicated it was a stipulated probation sentence that he is receiving and an added count that is a child abuse case which the defendant is looking at an open sentence which would include DOC community corrections or probation and that is why community correction screen was requested. The child abuse is a two to eight years DOC sentence open to probation and community correction, if the court sentences to DOC for the child abuse count, Mr. Allen would receive the DOC sentence and he would receive supervised probation once on parole for the child abuse. Balloting was opened.

5. Approval of the Minutes: Jim Reid moved to approve the meeting minutes for January 18, 2022, and the electronic meeting minutes for January 5, 12, and 26, 2022. Kirsten Swenson seconded. The motion passed unanimously by roll call vote.

6. Program Reports:

ComCor, Inc. (CCI): Mark Wester reported for CCI. Mr. Wester stated for January 2022 they had 148 Diversion; 56 Transition; 26 Division Out-of-District; 64 Non-Residential; 24 Intensive Residential Treatment (IRT), 10 Residential Dual Diagnosis (RDDT), 18 Community Responsibility Program (CRP), eight Non-CRP (sex offenders that receive therapy off-campus). He stated they referred 140 criteria cases. Mr. Wester reported CCI collected \$6,438.69 in child support and \$5,054.83 in restitution. The total assessed in restitution across all the clients in CCI is in excess of three million dollars that is owed. Mr. Wester stated that CCI had 36 admissions of which 16 were Diversion, six Transition, three Condition of Parole (COP), six Condition of Probation (COPr), and five transitions to non-residential status. He stated that they had 11 IRT; one RDDT; and three CRP admissions. Terminations for January were a total of 46 which includes about 48.6% successful completion of a total of 17, two clients that changed status 5.7 % which means the client for example transferred to IRT or was a reject after accept (RAA), about 45.7% negative termination; 12 escapes 34.4%; 2 house/technical violations; and 2 committed new crimes. Mr. Wester stated that there are 10 open positions - three in each security in case management and four in treatment staff and they continue to be aggressive in recruitment efforts. He stated CCI has implemented a pay increase for majority of the staff in January. Mr. Wester stated the employment rate is 76%, which is up 1% from last month; the regression rate is 5.7% roughly half from last month; the positive UAs rate is 7.8%. CCI has provided 7 Habits of Highly Effective People/7 Habits on the Inside Instructor Training for case management to enhance key principles of effectiveness within their field. The training also certified case management as instructors for 7 Habits, which would assist clients to effectively instill habits that provide pro-social change. CCI has implemented a night class based on client requests. Mr. Wester discussed the Pace Audit regarding Building 3950 renovation – began to empty several rooms at the back of the facility to begin cleaning and repairs. He discussed the Core Audit, in which he states they have contracted with a new urinalysis testing company to have the capacity to test for a wide range of commonly abused drugs such as fentanyl and prescription medications such as gabapentin. Mr. Wester mentioned that they are implementing 3, 10-hour shifts for technical staff with 2-hour overlaps to allow for more pro-social engagement and better detect incidents that may have occurred in the facilities.

a. Community Alternatives of El Paso County (CAE): Gwen Barlow reported for CAE. She stated that they had 159 clients of which 90 were Transition, 69 Diversion and 46 Non-Residential. She stated that CAE collected \$37,930 in subsistence and \$5,700 in restitution. Mrs. Barlow stated for admissions that there were 11 diversion clients, 9 transition and 5 diversion clients that transition over to non-residential status. For terminations for January

were a total successful: nine Diversion; five Non-Residential going out; nine Transition; four Non-Residential; negative terminations: seven Diversion; eight Transition; eight escapes. Mrs. Gwen stated for the escapes the trend they saw was substance abuse issues; increase pat searches; locker searches; room searches and finding substances on clients and rather the clients waiting for Colorado Springs Police Department (CSPD) to process the clients take off running. Mrs. Barlow stated for January CAE experienced a major outbreak of COVID-19 with clients and staff. There were 15 Diversion clients and 28 Transition clients that tested positive. CAE worked collaboratively with local and state health departments for testing and any additional assistance that CAE needs. CAE is doing weekly testing and just performed COVID testing on Monday and waiting on results. Due to COVID, there has been an increase in drug use and overdose during the lockdown. There were four overdoses in January. Mrs. Barlow applauses her staff on their quick responds by CPR and Narcan before AMR and fire arrives to assist them. For the increase of drugs and overdoses at the facility, CAE brought in a K9 vendor to target specific areas where the clients are housed and to eliminate the drug use. She stated that CAE would be working with the K9 vendor to make the dog search a regular monthly operation. Currently, there is one scheduled for this month. CAE is collaborating with the K9 vendor to increase the dog search to twice to three times a month. She stated that case managers have evaluated and assessed the clients to see if the clients are receiving appropriate treatment. Lori Griffith had a question regarding the status of filling the Director position. Mrs. Barlow stated GEO is currently reviewing applicants for the Director position and will begin interviews.

Reginald Short left the meeting at 12:45 pm.

7. Monthly Reports:

- a. <u>SFY22 Financial Report</u>: Angel Medina reported the current expected expenditure for SFY22; CAE is at 42.25%, representing 16.08% underspent, and that ComCor, Inc. is at 55.24%, representing 3.09% underspent.
- b. <u>Unauthorized Absence Report</u>: Angel Medina reported that there is a new report format; that it presents a fair picture; and he thanked Diane Frost for her collaboration with DCJ to extract the information from CCIB. He stated that for the end of January 2022, that CAE had 15 negative termination and 16 successful terminations. CCI had 18 negative terminations; 21 positive terminations; and 12 neutral terminations. The successful termination rate for CAE is 52% and CCI is 35%. He stated that CAE had 8 escapes and CCI had 11 escapes. Angel stated that Mr. Webster reported 12 escapes and we are constantly reviewing data input and cross-referencing data.

c. Staff Report:

Mr. Medina shared with the Board that increased drug use is a nationwide concern and that he is collaborating with DJC and parole to offer additional resources to the vendors.

The Justice Services Department relocated to 17 N. Spruce in Colorado Springs in a shared building with Colorado State University Extension; that he participated with DCJ on performance-based contracting (PBC); that DCJ submitted their PBC report to the legislature; that the vendor report reflects the metrics adopted under PACE and Core Security Audit standards; and discussed the Incident Notification Process. Mr. Medina shared Community Corrections Standard CC 020: The types of incidents regarding clients and/or staff members that require written notification to referral and oversight agencies.

- 9. New Business:
 - a. <u>Election of Board Chair and Vice Chair</u> Pursuant to Board by-laws, the Chair and Vice-Chair election was held for terms to run from March 2022 through February 2023.

Lori Griffith motioned Rose Roy as the Community Corrections Board Chair. Gil Suazo seconded. Kirsten Swenson motioned Jim Reid as Community Corrections Board Chair and Ryan Graham seconded. By roll call vote Rose Roy was elected as the Community Corrections Board Chair.

Pat Kelly asked for nominations for Vice-Chair.

Rose Roy motioned Lori Griffith as the Community Corrections Board Vice-Chair. Gil Suazo seconded. By roll call vote, the motion passed unanimously.

- b. Angel Medina shared that the 4th Judicial District is the second-largest district in Colorado for board processing and referrals; that Adams County is first; that the Board approval rate for transition clients was at 69% and 74% for Diversion clients; 65% for Condition of Parole Referrals; that these numbers provide a sense of the activity of the Board with the various populations.
- 10. Case Review Ballot Results: Results of the ballot were read.
- 11. Board/Staff Comments: Angel Medina and Board members thanked Judge Kelly for his service to the community and the Community Corrections Board and provided him with a Justice Services excellence coin.
- **12.** Adjournment: Chair Pat Kelly adjourned the meeting at 1:32 p.m.

	• Redeveloped new hire training to include more hands on training with the opportunity to practice the skills learned prior to being released to a facility. Facility managers are taking a greater role in new hire training as well. We are providing a full week of training and a shadowing period for consistant performance.

3950 RENOVATION:	We have begun to empty several rooms at the back of the facility to begin cleaning and repairs. We have designated our empty space at 3820 N. Nevada to serve as a workout room for all clients, eliminating the need to have weight equipment at the 3950 facility. Comcor has reviewed scope and architectural drawings with our architect. We have defined a revised scope of approximaly \$1M in improvements planned over the next year.



- 1. Beginning April 1, 2022, EPC Community Corrections will resume the normal screening process regarding Out-of-District referrals that were placed on hold since December 1st, 2021.
- 2. Pursuant to SB 21-271, Bill was the product of the Sentencing Task Force of the Colorado Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice (CCJJ) pursuant to the written directive of Governor Jared Polis by letter to the CJJJ June 24, 2020.
 - Primary objectives of the misdemeanor reform bill:
 - Create new classifications and sentencing ranges required a review of more than 1,100 crimes.
 - o Balance reduction in presumptive ranges with certainty in sentencing
 - o Eliminate or consolidate redundant offenses.
 - O Seek rehabilitation as a goal and reduce recidivism.
 - o Provide restoration and healing for victims and survivors of crime.
 - o Provide effective and consistent treatment options.

- o Promote accountability and responsibility for actions.
- o Reserve incarceration and detention for the most serious cases.
- o Delay effective date until March 1, 2022, to allow for administrative modifications, training, and corrections or revisions.
- 3. EPC attended a meeting where Probation announced they are looking to create a liaison position that directly supervises clients sentenced to Community Corrections.
