- 3. Rose Roy moved to approve the May 24, 2022 meeting minutes. Chris Garvin seconded. The motion carried unanimously.
- 4. The following committee chairs or representatives provided updates on committee activities:

Strategic Planning – Rosalie Roy Financial Resources – Dr. Alexis Harper Legislative Affairs – Brandon Wilson Pretrial Services – Dr. Alexis Harper Transition to Workforce – Dr. Alexis Harper Behavioral Health – PJ Higgins

- 5. As a note during the Financial Resources Committee report, Commissioner Williams and Russ Bogardus both highlighted the importance of training for writing proposals. Mr. Bogardus really recommended using graphics in proposals to improve chances of being approved for funding.
- 6. During the Metrics report, Dr. Harper provided a general overview of the reevaluated jail metrics, after having met with EPSO IT staff at the beginning of Q3, a more accurate method of analyzing and reporting length of stay (LOS) was determined, and this analysis has been reproduced for all quarters featured in the metrics sheet.

- 7. Council members provided very valuable feedback during the discussion and vote on what day/time to schedule CJCC quarterly meetings dates. Considerations from BoCC and Court leaders suggested that with enough advanced notice they could attend meetings. Dr. George Reed made a motion to approve 2023 meetings occur Tuesdays from 3-5PM. PJ Higgins seconded. The motion carried unanimously. Dr. Harper appreciated feedback on needing as much advanced notice as possible for meetings, and while sending calendar invitations multiple quarters in advance often creates attendance tracking issues, Dr. Harper will send an email with all calendar dates for 2023 CJCC quarterly meetings once approved in Q4, so members can add places holders to their own calendars to help schedule appropriately in advance of meetings. Quarterly meeting invites will be distributed for the next quarter within a week following the current quarter's meeting.
- 8. During Katie Blickenderfer's report on Diversus Health's services, Russ Bogardus asked what the entry points are for service at Diversus Health. Ms. Blickenderfer noted that there are walk-in services for citizens or where first responders can triage citizens to for service, routing through 911 and 988, and mobile response offers medical clearance in the field to direct them to providers rather than having to go to the Emergency Department. She highlighted the need to utilize these services to help make sure appropriate response is delivered and that citizens are accessing and receiving the services that will most specifically address their behavioral health needs.
- 9. During Steven Johnson's CSFD Community and Public Health Presentation, Russ Bogardus asked about how these services specifically help families. Mr. Johnson noted that very frequently they help individuals who are in crisis who do not have familial support, and will try to incorporate families, when possible, to reconnect families. Katie Blickenderfer offered that many people who seek crisis services have been unsuccessful in other forms of treatment and their behavior has unfortunately burned bridges with what was their existing network. It's important to have access to resources such as NAMI that helps people learn how to address behavioral health concerns among family members. Pete Carey also asked Mr. Johnson about the consideration of a regional CRT network. Mr. Johnson responded that they typically respond only within their jurisdiction and there might be challenges to implementing protocols across jurisdictions.

- 1. The Committee met virtually on October 20.
- 2. Action Plan Updates for the Strategic Planning Committee:
  - Objective A, tasks 1 and 2 were completed during 2022. The CJCC webpage and bylaws have both been updated.
  - Many partners have provided educational presentations to the CJCC this year, helping accomplish objective 2B – thank you to CommunityWorks, Diversus Health, and CSFD.
  - Progress has been made toward accomplishing objective C1 through the new data initiative of creating a criminal justice metrics tab within the CJCC webpage (more info in item 3).
  - The committee will pursue accomplishing B1 to "Host a State of the CJCC event" during the summer of 2023, as this will be the midway point through the current Action Plan.
- 3. The Committee had a broad discussion around data and metrics sharing objectives and challenges. Dr. Harper relayed that concerns about the reliability and validity of data, as well as the difficulties with requesting and receiving data/metrics on a regular basis, are posing challenges to the development of a data dashboard that attempts to house all partner data in one table. A reasonable solution is to provide organized public access to yearly CJCC metrics sheets and links to partner data resource through the creation of a "Metrics" tab within the CJCC website. An introduction of the new Metrics tab will be provided during agenda item #5A.
- 4. Members discussed meeting days for 2023 quarterly CJCC meetings. Suggested dates will be voted on for approval during this meeting's agenda item #5C.
- 5. The next committee meeting will be held January 26, 2023.

- 1. The committee met on September 13 and November 8.
- 2. Committee members are available to support the goals and objectives of other CJCC Committees. Programs designed to meet desired systemic change should be developed (on paper) before seeking funding and crafting a grant application. The Financial Resources Committee members have different areas of expertise and can assist efforts in creating programming. These areas of expertise include front and back-end consulting, evaluation assistance, outcomes and outputs development, and more. When designing your programs, please consider asking a member to join your efforts.
- 3. Serenity Recovery Connection, formerly Springs Recovery Connection, has moved to the old Boy Scout building off Fillmore and has raised \$2.5 million in capital funding for their collaborative recovery center.
- 4. The 4<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Court has received several grants congratulations!
  - a. Bureau of Justice Assistance Adult Drug Court Award 4yrs \$496,080 for a Problem-Solving Court Coordinator and evaluation services.
  - b. Office on Violence Against Women CASA of the Pikes Peak Region with 4<sup>th</sup> Judicial District as a sub-grantee for its Domestic Violence Problem Solving Court. The total grant provides \$550,000 for 3-years and includes a Problem-Solving Court Coordinator and funds for assessment services.
  - c. Victims Assistance Law Enforcement (VALE) grant The 4<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Collections Team received an award of \$305,380 to provide staffing support to collection efforts that provide restitution for victims. One-year award from Jan 2023 Dec 2023.
- 5. The 2022 Grant Tracking Spreadsheet is available on the CJCC Microsoft Team. Please update the spreadsheet as your agency applies for and is awarded or declined grants. We are currently have \$12,103,424 in third-party funding support for criminal justice projects.

1. El Paso County Elected Official Results

Numerous offices were up for election in El Paso County, including County Commissioner, Sheriff, Clerk & Recorder, Assessor, Coroner, Treasurer, and Surveyor.

#### Local Ballot Issue Results of Note

  - o Regulate retail marijuana
- City of Fountain Ballot Issue 2B Yes (55%)
  - Increase the city's existing property tax by 6.1 mills to be used exclusively for public safety

  - o Allow retail/recreational marijuana establishments

#### 3. Federal Offices

Incumbent Senator Michael Bennet (D) defeated Republican challenger Joe O'Dea to earn a third term in the US Senate.

Congressman Doug Lamborn (R) was re-elected to the House of Representatives, in the re-drawn 5<sup>th</sup> Congressional District, which now includes just El Paso County. He defeated Democrat David Torres and two minor party candidates.

#### 4. Statewide Offices

Statewide offices remain in Democrat control, as all four incumbent candidates prevailed over their Republican challengers.

- Jared Polis (D)
- Secretary of State Jena Griswold (D)
- State Treasurer Dave Young (D)
- Attorney General Phil Weiser (D)

## 5. General Assembly

Before the election, Democrats held a 21-14 advantage in the state Senate. This majority was bolstered when Sen. Kevin Priola changed his party affiliation from Republican to Democrat in August. Republicans hoped they could flip the state Senate, or at a minimum bring the Democrat majority down to only one or two seats. That outcome did not materialize on election night and Democrats expanded their majority and now have a 23-12 advantage going into the 2023 General Assembly session.

In the House, there were numerous seats deemed competitive for Republicans, including House District 18. In the end, Democrats picked up five seats and extended their veto proof majority to 46-19. During the 2022 session, Democrats held a 41-24 advantage.

## 9. What to Expect

The First Regular Session of the Seventy-fourth Colorado General Assembly will convene on Monday, January 9, 2023. With Democrats retaining all statewide elected offices, and increasing their numbers in both chambers, expect to see a session similar to those of the last few years. It remains to be seen what will be done in the criminal justice space during session, but the County will be keeping a close eye on rulemaking associated with the passage of Proposition 122 (Access to Natural Medicine).

Agendas for both parties will begin to come into focus over the next month or so and the El Paso County Government Affairs team, in coordination with the Sheriff's Office, will be keeping tabs on what's coming down the pike and will be sure to communicate any important updates to the group.

- 1. The Committee met on November 2.
- 2. Pretrial Assessments presented to the Advisement Court, Public Defender, and District Attorney has increased from 38% of the advisement docket in January 2022 to 84% in September 2022. This is in large part to new protocols for more efficiently collecting and reporting the most important information and increased staff capacity.
- 3. Data show a decrease in the appearance rate. Stakeholders and the Board will research innovative opportunities to increase defendant appearance.
- 4. Arnold Ventures Public Safety Series published an article, "<u>Pretrial Detention, Pretrial Release, and Public Safety</u>." This data-rich study reveals that holding a person in jail for any amount of time before trial may undermine public safety.
- 5. Pretrial CAB Action Plan Updates:
  - A1. Pretrial Supervision staff provides those defendants on a Supervised PR Bond
    with the condition of sobriety monitoring with information on treatment options.
    Information is also provided to individuals when they complete intake at the testing
    location and is available on the website.
  - A2. Staff is seeking input from local domestic violence agencies to obtain input on how best to provide resources for those defendants with domestic violence charges.
  - Staff plan to continue to improve their current work on enhancing resources and referrals for defendants. For 2023 staff plan to concentrate efforts on Objective B action items to clarify the pretrial process. The two tasks are:
    - 1. Establishing a pretrial process guide for defendants
    - 2. Create a pretrial personal responsibility checklist

- 1. The Behavioral Health Steering Committee met September 13, October 11, and November 8.
- 2. El Paso County Sheriff's Office Behavioral Health Connect (BHCON) team updates:
  - BCN4 Unit started with Fountain PD in July making 4 total units for BHCON. An FPD & EPSO units cover 7 days a week. Number of calls the team responded to, follow ups attempted and number of cover cars released went up with the addition of the 4th unit in Fountain. Further, we see average time to call reduced because Fountain's jurisdiction is smaller allowing for the units to get to calls guicker.

- Fountain PD and EPSO amended their MOU to include that Fountain BCN units will respond county wide when available to further regionalize the team.
- Case manager has resigned and the position will be open at the end of Oct.
   UCHealth will post this position to find a replacement.
- 3. The BHSC provided an in-depth review of the function and scope of medication assisted treatment (MAT) for members in September from Achieve Whole Recovery. Statewide legislative changes are expected to significantly increase the prevalence of MAT, especially in CJ settings. The group received information about when MAT is used and its effectiveness, and the group discussed how to determine the total population of MAT patients locally.
- 4. Following a careful review of existing programming, the BHSC has determined that the community needs to build more local infrastructure prior to moving towards a full-fledged AOT model. Given the level of cross-institution coordination required to manage a successful AOT model, the hope is to begin building more formalized cooperation between community partners and criminal justice system to establish the relationships that are key to successful implementation.
- 5. BHSC committee members are in the process of establishing their priorities for the next year of work. In October, members participated in a facilitated conversation to review the BHSC's strategic priorities, identify the 2-3 priorities that were most important to them and their organization, and then narrowing the group's focus to commonly held priorities. The priorities that emerged for the group going into next year are:
  - a. Access to care
    - i. Defining what access means
    - ii. Improving workforce strength and quality
    - iii. Closing gap between eligibility and actual access
    - iv. Identify low-hanging fruit like Medicaid enrollment on release
  - b. Data sharing and standardization
    - i. Creation of standardized definitions
    - ii. Building towards comparability of data
    - iii. Potential to establish data work group
  - c. Streamlining screening and assessment tools
    - i. Improve transfers between system node by increasing understanding of assessments used, areas of overlap, identify gaps
    - ii. Which orgs share assessments, which do not
- 6. Group members are beginning the process of planning to take action on these priorities by sharing organizational input on specific activities and potential outcomes for each of these three priorities.
- 7. The next Steering Committee meeting is scheduled for December 13, 2022.

CJCC partners have had numerous discussions around data and metrics sharing objectives and challenges, especially relating to concerns about the reliability and validity of data, as well as the difficulties with requesting and receiving data/metrics on a regular basis. These concerns have posed challenges to the development of a data dashboard that attempts to house all partner data in one table.

A reasonable solution is to provide organized public access to yearly CJCC metrics sheets through the creation of a "Metrics" tab within the CJCC website. This new tab also features links to data related resources provided by CJCC partners so information can be accessed through the proprietor of the data and information and any updates and changes are reflected within those individual agency websites.

By providing information in this way, it allows for agencies to update their information within their own time and abilities and resolves many concerns about the CJCC reporting information and data owned by different agencies and maintain an information source that requires such frequent updating from so many different partners.

Article III – Council Membership

Section 3 Council Member Attendance Expectations

Council members are encouraged to attend all regularly scheduled CJCC meetings each year, and shall attend at least two of the four quarterly meetings held annually, and will provide a representative from their organization or agency to attend all meetings they are unable to attend themselves.

- 3.1 Council members shall notify, in writing, the CJCC Chairperson and the Justice Services supporting staff, when they are unable to attend any regularly scheduled CJCC meetings, and will request to be excused prior to the meeting, providing the name and email of the representative that will attend in their absence.
- 3.2 A Council member's failure to notify as provided for above shall constitute an unexcused absence. Three consecutive unexcused absences shall be considered "inactive" member status.
- 3.3 The CJCC Chairperson has the discretion and authority to request that the El Paso County Board of Commissioners remove an inactive member and appoint a new member, if warranted due to excessive unexcused absences or lack of effective participation.
